1. Identify Choices

Clare was allowed to choose any character, so she chose Jordan, even though Jordan is not named in the poem.

2. Identify the Task

Clare was asked to determine how Jordan's point of view would differ from Nick's. Moving into first person helps her accomplish this.

3. Find Support

Clare gathers support for her interpretation of Jordan's perspective from scenes that did or could take place in the novel.

4. Organize

Clare separates her poem into two stanzas and uses the first to set the scene and the second to dive more deeply into Jordan's thoughts and point of view.

5. Draw Conclusions

By the end of her poem, Clare uses metaphors to convey not just Jordan's literal experience but also her feelings.
